

## Importance of the Grade 10 FCAT

According to Florida law, students must meet all academic requirements in order to receive a standard high school diploma from a public school. This means that students must take required courses, earn the correct number of credits, maintain a passing grade point average, **and pass the Reading and Mathematics Sunshine State Standards (SSS) portion of the Grade 10 FCAT.** Students who meet these requirements, but do not pass the Grade 10 FCAT, will receive a Certificate of Completion, which is not equivalent to a standard high school diploma.

In accordance with s. 1008.22(3)(c), F.S., the Grade 10 FCAT Writing+ test will become a graduation requirement beginning in 2010. This means that a student enrolled in Grade 9 for the first time in the 2006-07 school year must achieve a passing score on the Grade 10 FCAT Writing+ assessment in addition to the current reading and mathematics requirements in order to graduate with a standard high school diploma.

The passing scores for the Grade 10 FCAT Reading and Mathematics SSS and Retake tests and the Grade 10 FCAT Writing+ test are determined by the State Board of Education and are as follows:

FCAT SSS Reading	FCAT SSS Mathematics	FCAT SSS Writing+
1926 (scale score of 300) or above	1889 (scale score of 300) or above	300

## Graduation Options

Students can retake the FCAT as many times as they want, until they pass it, and can enroll for a “free” 13<sup>th</sup> year of public education should they need additional instruction to successfully pass the FCAT. Students have up to six opportunities to pass the Grade 10 FCAT prior to graduation. Students who do not pass the FCAT in the spring of their sophomore year may retest in fall, spring, and summer of their junior and senior years.

Florida students do have other options. A senior can graduate by receiving a score comparable to the FCAT passing score on the ACT or SAT. See the chart below for the concordant scores that have been in place since the 2003-04 school year:

Per s. 1008.22(9), F.S., a student must take the Grade 10 FCAT a total of three times without earning a passing score in order to use these scores from the ACT or SAT. This requirement does not apply to a student new to the public school system in Grade 12.

Seniors with a Certificate of Completion may enroll in any community college in the state by taking the College Placement Test (CPT) to determine if they qualify to register for credit or must take remedial courses.

Finally, if students have not received passing FCAT scores, they can enroll in a GED preparation course. As each school district can adopt different policies and rules regarding this option, students should obtain a copy of the *Student Progression Plan* for their county for a better understanding of the rules and policies adopted by their school board. ## *Previous FCAT Passing Scores*

Students who were originally scheduled to graduate in 2003 are still eligible for a lower passing score of 1856 (scale score of 287) or higher on FCAT SSS Reading and 1868 (scale score of 295) or higher on FCAT SSS Mathematics.
