INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE OF THE GUIDE

Widespread substance use and violence among young people at all levels of American society has presented the public with a set of critical and unprecedented problems. Few people need to be informed that a substance use and violence problem exists, but there is tremendous confusion about How To, When To, and Where To react.

This guide has been compiled in an attempt to answer the above questions and to provide immediate access to available resources in our community. Every effort has been made to make this guide comprehensive in nature, however, if an agency or organization has been omitted, we apologize.

USE OF THE RESOURCE GUIDE

This comprehensive resource guide has been designed to assist the user in understanding the various types of resources available to the Jacksonville community. The resources have been listed alphabetically as well as divided into four components: treatment agencies, counseling agencies, support groups, and community/professional/education organizations. Additional information on individual agencies and organizations has been arranged alphabetically for your convenience.

DESCRIPTION OF THE FOUR GROUPS CLASSIFIED IN THIS GUIDE

Treatment Agency: A facility that provides the necessary techniques and process by which a person receives organized help to deal with a substance abuse problem with the goal of an eventual return to normal functioning.

Counseling Agency: A resource agency that provides counseling and support for individuals and their families.

Support Group: Any organization of people recovering from some form of dependency or trauma who agree to help each other in the recovery process.

Community/Professional Organization: Those organizations whose primary focus is to provide awareness and support for individuals and families in our community.

SYMPTOMS OF POSSIBLE ADOLESCENT CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY

FRIENDS:

1. Changing attitude toward straight friends
2. Change in circle of friends with little interest in old friends
3. Parents don't know friends; don't know names or addresses
4. Begins to hang out with an older crowd
5. Strange telephone calls; parties hang up or refuse to be identified
6. Superficial relationships based on drugs

FAMILY:

1. Changing attitude toward rules and regulations, parents, brothers, and sisters. Often exhibits negative/defiant behavior
2. Sometimes compliant and agreeable, but fails to follow through with promises made
3. Lack of participation in family activities
4. Isolation—frequently stays in room or away from home
5. Breaking curfew or sneaking out past curfew
6. Lying; blaming others for irresponsible actions
7. Stealing (money, pills, goods to be sold)
8. Mood swings – tense family relationships, “walking on eggshells”
9. Violence; physical and verbal
10. Erratic sleeping habits; extremes of much or little – frequent naps
11. Erratic eating habits – extremes - possible Anorexia/Bulimia

SCHOOL:

1. Lack of motivation
2. Sleeping in class
3. Grades begin falling for inexplicable reasons
4. Skipping classes or entire days
5. Drops out of sports and other activities
6. Disrespectful of teachers, assignments, rules and regulations

7. Frequent suspensions
8. Expulsions

SPIRITUAL:

1. Decreasing interest in attending church
2. Uncomfortable talking about religion
3. Devil worship or involved in an occult – black candles, medallions representing the devil

PHYSICAL/PSYCHOLOGICAL:

1. Alcohol can be smelled on breath
2. Alcohol hangover: a) headaches, b) stomachaches, c) flu-type symptoms, d) vomiting, e) tremors
3. Bloodshot eyes or frequent use of eye drops – Visine/Murine
4. Deep, nagging cough; dry and persistent; acute/chronic bronchitis
5. Chronic or persistent stomach problems
6. Weight loss-weight gain/pallor
7. Lethargic attitude; doesn't seem to be interested in anything
8. Undisciplined; doesn't get things done on time or as agreed upon
9. Change in grooming habits
10. Sometimes inappropriately happy; sometimes inexplicably depressed
11. Hallucinations and flashbacks

LEGAL:

1. Shoplifting
2. Unruly, delinquent, runaways
3. Petty theft – Grand Theft
4. Breaking and Entering
5. Public Intoxication
6. D.W.I./D.U.I.'s
7. Automobile accidents/ near misses
8. Assaults
9. Prostitution

EMOTIONAL:

1. Impaired judgment – adolescent places self in dangerous situations
2. Accident proneness
3. Self-mutilation, such as cutting, tattoos or burn marks
4. May talk of suicide
5. Suicide attempts
6. Overdoses/hospitalizations
7. Violence – physical/verbal; vandalism

INTELLECTUAL:

1. Burn-out
2. Inability to recall; short-term, long-term memory loss
3. IQ sometimes lowers
4. Blackouts
5. Individual fails to operate at appropriate maturational level

MISCELLANEOUS:

1. Financial management poor; seems to spend a lot of money and frequently asks for money
2. Uses profanity
3. Sudden change in slang; “junkie” behavior observed
4. Paraphernalia kept or admired; rolling paper, bongs, roach clips
5. Drug magazines
6. Dwindling liquor supply
7. Sexually acting out/promiscuity
8. Pregnancy/abortion
9. Drug jewelry—marijuana leaf, roach clips, baby pacifiers

Many of these behaviors may develop apart from drug use, but the number and degree of severity should raise the suspicion of chemical dependency.

WHY KIDS GET INVOLVED WITH VIOLENCE AND/OR GANGS?

- ⇒ **Poverty**
- ⇒ **Fear**
- ⇒ **Need to protect self or family**
- ⇒ **Need to belong or be recognized**
- ⇒ **Low self-esteem**
- ⇒ **Cultural expectations**
- ⇒ **Avoidance of rejection**
- ⇒ **Intimidation**
- ⇒ **Too much unstructured, non-supervised time**
- ⇒ **Profit from illegal drug trade**
- ⇒ **Family tradition**
- ⇒ **Lack of social activity, “No place to go”**
- ⇒ **Not wanting to feel different**
- ⇒ **Peer pressure**
- ⇒ **Lack of religion, value system, or ethics within youth’s home**
- ⇒ **Sense of adventure**
- ⇒ **Lack of parental interest and support**
- ⇒ **Self deception**
- ⇒ **Insecurity**
- ⇒ **Lack of education, lack of success in school, dropping out**

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF A PROGRAM

The following are important criteria to use in selecting a program for an adolescent who is using drugs:

1. Programs that view drug use as the primary disease and not as the symptom of some other emotional problem. Mental health wards tend to see drug use as a symptom and work on other things hoping it will go away. Effective programs see drug use as the problem and direct attention to dealing with the child's drug use. **However**, the availability of either additional counseling or a dual diagnosis should be an option, if needed. (Keep in mind that an emotional problem CANNOT be dealt with until AFTER drug problem is dealt with. Drugs enable a person "not to feel" making an emotional problem unavailable and impossible to deal with.)
2. An Abstinence Point of View. Effective drug rehabilitation programs believe that drug use is a chronic, non-curable disease. This means that abstinence from all mood-altering chemicals is necessary for recovery.
3. A Drug-Free Environment. In order for a child to deal rationally with their emotional and behavioral problems, they have to be free of the influence of mood altering chemicals. Since marijuana and its mood altering chemical Delta-9 THC remain in the nervous system for a long period after use, it is important to place a child in a therapeutic environment, which is drug free for a minimum of 45 to 60 days in order to **begin** effective therapy.
4. Peer Counseling. As Alcoholics Anonymous has proven, effective programs involve those who have the problem, are recovering, and are helping others who have the problem.
5. Family Treatment. Effective programs treat drug-use (chemical dependency) as a family systems disease. The drug user ends up affecting the behavior and feelings of others in the family. Good programs provide not just involvement but real treatment for all members of the family.
6. Alcoholics Anonymous Tools of Change. Effective programs use the twelve steps as a spiritual program of rehabilitation and change.
7. Intensive Therapy Process. Given the integration of drug-use and the sub-culture of adolescence in America, it takes a very intensive residential program to help adolescent's effect change away from drug use.
8. Progressive Life Reintegration. Since drug use is a disease, it affects all areas of the adolescent's life. Good programs assist the adolescents in progressively reconstructing each area of life including family, school, friendships, use of leisure time, and pairing.

SUGGESTED QUESTIONS/CRITERIA TO DETERMINE INDIVIDUAL APPROPRIATENESS OF A TREATMENT FACILITY FOR ADOLESCENTS

Most of the agencies listed in this book will provide information and some basic education. Many people are hesitant to admit the possibility that a family member or child needs help. When people decide to seek help, it is many times the result of a crisis incident; then, they want help NOW! The first thing most people need is someone to talk to. An agency that has someone who can provide you with information and strategies for getting help for your child, and is willing to assist you in education and appropriate referral is important. This first step function is provided by most of the agencies listed. Regardless of what agency you contact, you will need to ask several key questions:

- ? **Can I afford the care proposed? Will my insurance cover the cost?**
- ? **Is there a less costly alternative?**
- ? **Does the child need detoxification in an inpatient setting?**
- ? **Is there an active education/support/counseling service for family members?**
- ? **Are family members required to participate in the treatment program?**
- ? **Does the agency continue to provide counseling and support services after the initial treatment period?**
- ? **Does the staff seem to know what they are doing; do they understand and listen to your problems and concerns?**
- ? **Would you go to the agency if you had a problem?**
- ? **Is the agency aware of other sources in the state and community that can help with the clients' problem?**
- ? **Is the agency equipped to deal with substance use and mental health issues?**

Goal:

Alcoholics Anonymous is made up of compulsive drinkers, both men and women, who join with each other in a mutual effort to remain sober. Alcoholics, themselves in their despair and hopelessness, began this program.

The AA Meeting:

Members of AA meet regularly in "Groups" which are the basic operating unit of the organization. Meetings are held in all areas of town, often at churches, clubs, schools, etc. There are no upper or lower limits on the number of persons in the Group. Ideal group size usually evolves into 15 to 35 persons so that anyone in the Group can be afforded the opportunity to be heard during the limited time (normally one hour) allowed for the meeting. A chairperson presides over the meeting and assures an orderly flow of ideas and opinions. A pre-selected topic, usually chosen by the chairperson, having to do with the maintenance of one's sobriety or the problems encountered in maintaining sobriety is thrown open to the floor for discussion or comment by any one present. Thus, those who attend have an opportunity to learn from a diverse accumulation of points of view and the obstacles and pitfalls to be

aware of in their daily living, which might be threatening to the maintenance of sobriety or presage a relapse into drinking behavior. In order to preserve and maintain anonymity, only first names are used at the level of press, radio and films. An "Open Discussion" meeting, may be attended by anyone, a "Closed Group" meeting is limited to people who are an alcoholic or a member of AA. One need not be an alcoholic or a member of AA to attend any meeting that is characterized as "Open." There are several other types of meetings available (185 different groups meeting over 200 times weekly throughout Jacksonville). Some of these are:

- a) Closed Discussion - Normally limited to admitted alcoholics (members of AA).
- b) Beginners Open Discussion - For those who have never attended a meeting before or have only attended a few prior meetings.
- c) Open Speakers Meeting - A guest speaker, invited, usually from another group, relates how his alcoholism developed, how he behaved while drinking, how he came to AA, and how his life is now.
- d) Step Meeting (Open or Closed) - One or more of the 12 steps to recovery are discussed in depth.
- e) Other - Book meetings where literature published by AA is discussed.

Chemical Dependency Counseling, Inc. works with patients on an outpatient basis in a home setting in the Riverside area. The agency works with teenagers and adults of both sexes. Sixty percent of the clients are on a voluntary basis while forty percent are referred by legal sources.

The intake procedure includes detoxification evaluation (outside referral if needed), intake/evaluation interview with individual program design and placement in treatment program. The client begins education classes, group therapy, and additional classes with concurrent attendance at AA/NA meetings. An in-depth study of addiction, its processes, and the disease concept are an integral part of the educational program. In the group process, the client examines the underlying causes of his/her individual addiction process and develops life plans for coping without substance use.

CDC maintains contact with clients and follows them for 18 months after completion of treatment. Successful treatment is seen as definable improvement in problem areas and sobriety with a 65% success rate achieved.

Fees for services from clients pay for the agencies expenses. Personal marketing is used to inform the community of the services of the CDC. Follow-up data is used to evaluate the program and prepare for future goals.

First Coast Child Protection Team (previously called The Children's Crisis Center, Inc.) is a private, non-profit corporation formed for the specific and primary purpose of the advancement of charity and education in the field of child abuse and neglect. The Center provides services for the assessment of abused and neglected children and their families. The Center sponsors programs in INTERVENTION, when abuse or neglect has occurred, and TREATMENT, for victims of abuse and neglect and their families.

Programs of the First Coast Child Protection Team are funded by contracts for the State of Florida Department of Health, State of Florida Attorney General's Office, Florida Crimes Compensation, City of Jacksonville, other foundations, grants and community donations. Services are provided without regard to race, creed, color, national origin, or economic status.

Program Goals:

First Coast Child Protection Team is a committed team of professionals and volunteers whose mission is to prevent all forms of child abuse through education, intervention, treatment, support and advocacy, ensuring that every child has the opportunity to grow in a nurturing home and community.

Intervention Programs:

The Child Protection Team: The Child Protection Team uses a crisis-oriented, multi-disciplinary approach for the evaluation and treatment of the abused and neglected child and family. It is recognized that families in need of assistance must have access to resources from medical, social service, legal and psychological components to address the multi-faceted problems they face and to develop a broad and similarly multi-faceted plan for appropriate

treatment. The Team is composed of a pediatrician director, team pediatricians, nurse practitioners, coordinator of clinical services, team psychologist, case coordinators (from either a nursing or social work background), a team attorney and support staff. The team is located at 4539 Beach Blvd., Suite 4100, and is accessible to the Department of Children and Families, hospitals, physicians and community agencies involved in abuse or neglect cases. The team also has a satellite office located in Green Cove Springs. The team provides direct services within Duval, Clay, and St. Johns counties, with services to Baker and Nassau counties as well.

A team case coordinator and medical professionals are available 24 hours a day to provide access to crisis intervention, case coordination, family system evaluation and consultations, as well as other team services.

Professionals suspecting abuse and/or neglect can consult with the Child Protection Team member on a 24-hour, seven-day a week basis by calling 633-0300, or the Green Cove Office at the University of Florida, Department of Pediatrics, 904-284-7264. Referrals should be made at the time of crisis for the Child Protection Team to be most effective. The Child Protection Team is funded through the Florida Department of Health, Victims of Crime Assistance (VOCA) through the Florida Attorney General's Office, and United Way.

Child Sexual Abuse Program:

The Child Sexual Abuse Program is an integral component of the Child Protection Team, and provides services to children sexually victimized by adult non-caretakers, non-caretakers under the age of 18 and/or siblings under 18 years of age. The program is designed to offer crisis intervention, social assessments of families, referral services, follow-up case management and forensic examinations to victims of these types of sexual abuse. A Teen Rape support group is offered to these victims and counseling for their caretakers is available as well. Plans are underway to implement an Adolescent Advocacy Program in conjunction with the Women's Center of Jacksonville to provide an advocate for the victim from the time of crisis. This program is funded by the Victims of Crime Assistance (VOCA) through the Florida Attorney General's Office, City of Jacksonville and United Way.

Treatment Programs:

Sexual Abuse Treatment Program: The Sexual Abuse Treatment Program is a component of the Child Protection Team with an oversight by Children's Home Society. This is a therapeutic program for families who are victims of sexual abuse. Working collaboratively with private psychological services within the community, the treatment program helps families from the time of crisis (when the abuse is reported) through long-term therapy. The goals for this program are to stop any sexual abuse behavior from recurring in the family and to ultimately create healthier family relationships. Referrals are made through the Child Protection team. This program is funded through the Florida Department of Health.

Other Programs:

Volunteers: The Children's Crisis Center is dependent upon volunteers from the community to operate its programs through various capacities. Volunteers may provide support directly to clients through our prevention and intervention programs or by supporting Center operations or participation in the Center's Speakers' Bureau.

Florida Abuse Registry: Statewide 1-800-96 ABUSE or FAX 1-800-914-0004 for ALL reporting of suspected child abuse, neglect and sexual abuse.

The Child Victim Rapid Response Program (CVRRP) is a school-based program designed to address the needs of students and their family members who have endured, witnessed, or are targets of domestic or date-related violence, child abuse, sexual abuse or neighborhood violence. Program services include provision of education to students and educators on topics of victimization and abuse; consultation and assistance to educators regarding students who may be victims or potential victims of violence; advocacy for children, including referrals to community agencies, assistance in filing victims' compensation claims, and follow-up with the child and family, and access to emergency legal services.

The Women’s Center provides advocacy for rape victims, information and referrals, mental health counseling, and community education programs.

Description of Services:

The Women’s Center of Jacksonville (WCJ) is a community based resource center for women and their loved ones. Our unique community services include:

Information and Referral

We provide Northeast Florida women with reliable, non-biased information and referrals regarding financial emergencies, shelter, pregnancy, domestic violence, employment, medical and mental health care, childcare, legal assistance, and more. This help line is operated by trained staff and volunteers.

Community Education

WCJ presents numerous educational workshops at various locations around the city. The seminars are open to the public and are often free of charge. Some of our past programs include: positive parenting, career transitions, legal issues, divorce, menopause, sexual harassment, politics, and finance.

Bosom Buddies

Bosom Buddies is a specialize program in breast health that provides support, educational information, and advocacy for women diagnosed with breast cancer and women at high risk. Bosom Buddies hosts a weekly Support Group meeting at the Women’s Center of Jacksonville.

Expanded Horizons

Expanded Horizons is a gender specific program designed to meet the learning needs of women and reduce the barriers to access services such as child care, transportation and scheduling. The program addresses many types of literacy needs, such as reading, writing, math, computer skills, GED preparation, and life skills such as financial and health literacy. To help them meet their goals, participants work with a corp of trained volunteer tutors, individually and in small classes to create individual learning plans.

Girls Circles

Designed to encourage girls' development of positive body images, self-confidence and self-esteem, this program works with girls (ages 9-17) in a small group setting, i.e., a girls circle. Targeted curriculum and activities are utilized by trained facilitators within the circle to foster the girls' healthy development.

Art and Soul

Art and Soul transforms the walls of WCJ into gallery space for fabulous art by regional women artists with a different theme for each quarterly exhibit.

Rape Recovery Team

The Rape Recovery Team is an on-call 24 hours/day, 7 days/week, 365 day/year for victims of sexual violence, whether or not they report the crime to the police. Advocates provide crisis intervention, emotional support, and long-term follow-up, including services for adolescents assaulted by non-caregivers. Promote Truth is a teen website offering educational information about sexual violence, rape, drugs, facts for guys, legal issues, and rape statistics; <http://www.promotetruth.org/> also provides support through anonymous messaging. .

Rape Recovery Team Rape Education

Advocates on the Rape Recovery Team provide educational presentations on rape and relationship violence prevention throughout the Jacksonville community.

Stop Violence Against Elders (SVAE)

Stop Violence Against Elders, a special project of the Rape Recovery Team, is a collaboration between the Women's Center of Jacksonville and Hubbard House, providing innovative training and education to professionals in the fields of law enforcement, criminal justice, victim services, elder-care facilities, and elder serving agencies, on recognizing, addressing, investigating, and prosecuting cases of sexual and/or domestic violence against elders.

Counseling

Our counseling services include: individual, group, couples, and family therapy. WCJ counseling services are confidential and available with a flexible fee structure. Specialized programs are offered for victims of sexual violence and adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse.

HIV/AIDS Voices Program

The Voices Program empowers women with HIV/AIDS to increase their self-esteem and discover ways to regain control of their life through holistic healing of the mind, body and spirit. Through individual and group counseling sessions, women share their experiences with other women in a safe, confidential, and supportive environment. Additional services include anonymous HIV testing, home visits, retreats, information, and referrals. All services within the Voices Program are free to participants and their affected family members.

Community Outreach:

The Women's Center publishes a quarterly newsletter, schedule of programs, and periodic bulletins. Speakers are available to speak on the services provided by the Center or on other women's issues. Volunteers are always needed to assist with special projects and work within the programs.

Clinical Staff Information:

Professional staff includes licensed clinical social workers, mental health counselors, registered mental health counselor interns, and certified rape recovery advocates.
